Transcript

First off, let me tell you about the *Mary Celeste*, which is also called 'the ghost ship'. In November 1872, the *Mary Celeste* ship left New York on its way to Genoa in Italy. The captain was Benjamin Briggs. On board the ship, there were eight crew members, plus Briggs' wife and their two-year-old daughter. At that time, the journey from New York to Genoa could take many months, so they took plenty of supplies. There was even a piano and a sewing machine! However, on December 5th, a British ship saw a ship floating near the Azores islands, which are close to Portugal. When the British crew went onboard, they found that the ship was completely empty. Captain Briggs, his family and all his crew had gone, and one lifeboat was missing. There were no problems with the ship, and it wasn't damaged. There was still enough food and supplies for six months at sea. The captain and crew were never seen again.

I've done a bit of research to find out what possibly happened. There are a lot of crazy theories. Some people believe that pirates attacked the ship or maybe even a sea monster or giant octopus! Some scientists think that the captain was worried that a bad smell from the bottom of the ship was dangerous, so he told everyone to get off the ship.

reported speech

We use reported speech to tell someone what another person said.

We usually introduce reported speech with *said* or *told* (+ person). It's optional to use *that* after *said* or *told*. We change the pronouns in reported speech, e.g. I changes to *he* or *she*.

We change the verb tense in reported speech.

present simple 'I run to school'.	1
	He said (that) he ran to school.
present continuous 'I'm running to school'.	2
	He said (that) he was running to school.
past simple 'I ran to school'.	3
	He said (that) he had run to school.
present perfect 'I've run to school'.	4
	He said (that) he had run to school.
future with <i>will</i> 'I will run to school'.	5
	He said (that) he would run to school.
modal verb 'I might run to school'.	6
	He said (that) he might run to school.
<i>be going to</i> 'I'm going to run to school'.	7
	He said (that) he was going to run to school.

say or tell?

We use *say* or *tell* in reported speech. Use *say* **without** an object or pronoun. *Erica said* (*that*) *she was late.* **NOT** *Erica said me* (*that*) *she was late.*

Use *tell* **with** an object or pronoun. *Erica told me (that) she was late.* **NOT** *Erica told (that) she was late.*
